A Message from the Secretary

The president has announced the federal strategy for Homeland Security and North Carolina is again leading the way in safeguarding our citizens. The strategic objectives of homeland security in order of priority are to:

- Prevent terrorist attacks within the United States;
- Reduce America's vulnerability to terrorism; and
- Minimize the damage and recover from attacks that do occur.

Among the efforts the president has called for are some things we are already doing:

- Training North Carolina's 35,000 law enforcement officers to recognize and interdict terrorist activity;
- Upgrading our public health laboratory facilities and training to recognize and respond to a bio-terrorism attack;
- Improving our hazardous materials response and urban search and rescue capabilities;
- Protecting food supplies, and improving prevention, interdiction and response efforts for a foreign animal disease outbreak;
- Safeguarding critical computer systems, and many other areas.

I appreciate the work all of you are doing in this effort while we continue to handle our regular responsibilities as CCPS employees. Thank you.

CVS and Eckerd are continuing their negotiations with AdvancePCS. While both chains had announced earlier their intent to withdraw from the AdvancePCS pharmacy network, they now have indicated a willingness to continue to serve retirees, teachers and state employees under the NC Teachers and State Employees Comprehensive Major Medical Plan.

Both CVS and Eckerd will continue to fill state employees' prescriptions for the co-pay amount while negotiations continue with AdvancePCS. All other chains, including Kerr, Wal-Mart, K-Mart, PharMor, Walgreens, Sams and Target continue to serve Plan members. Many grocery stores, including Harris Teeter, Winn-Dixie and Kroger, also fill prescriptions for Plan members. Most independent pharmacies continue to serve Plan members, as well.

All updated information will be disseminated as soon as it is made available to the Benefits & Safety Office.
